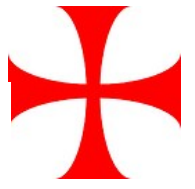

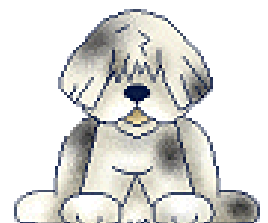

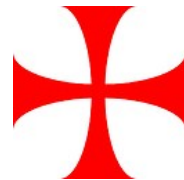
Paws for thought! [by Molly]

National Stewardship Programme—Challenge to the Church

The theme of our magazine this month is New Beginnings and that's exactly what the General Assembly agreed in May last year when it decided to instruct all congregations to participate in a national stewardship programme starting in 2012. The Programme offers individual congregations a number of stewardship options and the Currie Kirk Stewardship Planning Group has decided to adopt what's known as the *stewardship season* approach. This approach gives us the opportunity to explore the different elements of Christian stewardship (the giving of time, talents and money) separately over a three year period, with a month each year being designated as our stewardship season.

February will be Currie Kirk's *Stewardship Season*. The first Sunday of February will be the Heriot Watt University Anniversary Service (featured elsewhere in this Clipboard) but on the second, third and fourth Sundays our worship will focus on the Christian giving of time. Next year we will turn our thoughts to the Christian giving of talents and in February 2014 we will think again about the Christian giving of money.

We have been instructed to send the following leaflet to all our members; it includes a letter from the Moderator of the General Assembly.

From the Rt Rev David Arnott, Moderator of the General Assembly— to all who are part of the Church of Scotland

I never cease to be amazed by the generosity of Church of Scotland members and regular worshippers. Thank you for your continuing support and generosity. They, and you, are helping to make the church what it is.

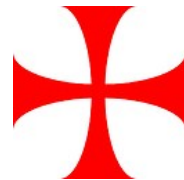

Our vision

The Church of Scotland seeks to inspire the people of Scotland and beyond with the Good News of Jesus Christ through enthusiastic worshipping, witnessing, nurturing and serving communities.

The Church of Scotland needs every member and adherent, everyone who is part of the Church, to give to fulfil this vision, which we believe is God’s purpose for us today.

How should we give?

The people of ancient Israel brought the ‘first fruits’ of the harvest as an offering to God (*Deuteronomy 26: 1-11*).

- **Our giving should be a priority in our spending.**

The people of ancient Israel and the people of Jesus’ time were expected to give a tithe of their income as an offering to God (*Ezra 2: 69 and Acts 11: 27-30*).

- **Our giving should be proportionate to our income.**

The poor widow put two small copper coins in the temple treasury (*Luke 21: 1-4*). She wasn’t being mean: it was all the money she had—truly sacrificial giving.

- **Our giving should be generous, even sacrificial.**

Jesus rebuked those who were selfish and unwilling to share their wealth (*Luke 12: 13-21*). The first Christians displayed a willingness to share – surrendering individual possessions for the common good (*Acts 2: 43-47 and 4: 32 -37*) and helping to support poorer congregations (*2 Corinthians 8: 1-15*).

- **Our giving should display our willingness to share what we have to fulfil God’s purposes in his world.**

In practical terms ...

The Church of Scotland encourages us to give in a committed way – either by using offering envelopes or by setting up a standing order from our bank accounts to our congregation’s bank account.

The Church of Scotland encourages us, if we pay tax, to sign a Gift Aid Declaration. This increases the value of our offering by 25% as the congregation can reclaim the tax we have already paid on the money we are giving.

The Church of Scotland encourages us to consider making a gift to the Church in our Wills – either to our congregation, or to the work of one of the Councils and Committees of the General Assembly, e.g. Ministries, Social Care, World Mission. Over the years, legacies have provided much needed extra money for the work of the Church—local, national, global.

The National Stewardship Programme invites ALL OF US to REVIEW our giving and, if possible, INCREASE our offering to God for the work of his Church. Every congregation is expected to participate in this programme. Ask your elder or minister what will be happening in your congregation.

Living and loving God, you give us so much.

Living and loving God, the world needs what you have to give.

Help us to give generously to share the good news of your love through the worship, fellowship, outreach and service of your Church and make a real difference to the life of your world.

Above is a copy of an email received from St. Luke's Leprosarium. You may remember about 8 years ago following their visit to the Leprosarium, Gordon MacKinlay and his wife Jennifer gave us a very interesting talk and presentation in the Church one Sunday morning. Colin and Isabel Sharp, former members of our church, also visited the Leprosarium and on their return spoke to the Guild. Currie Kirk then embarked on various fund raising activities and since then we have hosted at various times throughout each year four breakfasts and dinners, plus our Boys' Brigade Company also hosted a breakfast and dinner each year from funds raised through one of their 'Praise Evenings'.

The St. Luke's Leprosarium is situated in a highly endemic area where leprosy is prevalent. Founded by Dr. Vedabodagam in 1954 it is run by the Thoothukudi-Nazareth Diocese of Church of South India (CSI). 100% of the expenses are met by donors and well-wishers.

The Leprosarium offers free treatment to the sufferers of leprosy without any distinction of caste, creed or religion. Thousands are treated as outpatients and about one hundred as inpatients. Leprosy patients lose sensitivity in their hands and feet and sometimes the leprosy can cause blindness. St Luke's offers shelter to such desperately disabled patients and they are cared for at the Leprosarium for life.

Christmas Fair 2011

The Hospitality Committee organised this event on 3 December and are delighted to report that a total in excess of £2,000 was raised over two hours. The money was divided equally between Bethany; Cookers for Christmas; Down's Syndrome Lothian; and Gate 55 at Wester Hailes, all of whom are very grateful.

The Fair was officially opened by Margaret Douglas, a lady well known in our village, who carried out her duties most graciously. Dudley Williams entertained everyone on the Keyboard, with festive music— a joy to listen to. The Committee is very grateful to them for giving of their time so willingly. Many people gave generously to fill the stalls and others manned the "stampede" of shoppers.

It is impossible for me to name individually everyone who helped at the Christmas Fair, but be assured you are very much appreciated, without your support this event could not take place and we would not be able to help the charities who need it most.

Thank you to all who gave of their time and talents to make the Christmas Fair an outstanding success.

The Church of Scotland Guild



The Church of Scotland Guild begins 2012 in celebratory mode for this year marks its 125th anniversary. It is a magnificent milestone to reach— particularly in today’s age where the pace of change accelerates every year and society is expected to follow.

The Guild shares the same founder as *Life and Work*, the magazine of the Church of Scotland: the visionary Victorian, the Rev Professor Archibald Charteris who launched the Guild eight years after *Life and Work*. His third legacy to the Church, which also survives to this day, was, of course, the Daiconate.

Like his vision for *Life and Work*, of a journal which would allow the Church to communicate effectively, Charteris, a strong supporter of the work of women in the Church, faced ridicule and scorn on the floor of the Assembly over his plans and had to battle passionately for both support and recognition for the fledgling organisation.

As with any new initiative, the dream faltered a little initially. The introduction of a Guild Supplement to *Life and Work* brought support for the innovative organisation, but it was not until Charteris’ wife Katy took over the editing of the Supplement that it appeared to capture the imagination and the membership swelled.

Initially founded to bring more women into the Church, the Guild has proved to be its enduring conscience and backbone. It has stood the test of time—embracing social change and simply doing what it does best: actively working and campaigning for a better world in Christ’s name—effectively captured in the Guild motto: “Whose we are and Whom we serve.”

The Guild has quietly raised millions of pounds for worthy causes, both at home and overseas. Whether this is practical help for local communities at a congregational level, or speaking out against injustice such as the boycott of oranges from South Africa in protest at Apartheid or the trafficking of women and children at a national and international level, the Guild continues to be an important and uniting presence within the Church of Scotland.

Where once the Guild would be parodied by scornful Scottish comedians as little more than a bunch of tea-making women (which was never an accurate or realistic depiction) today the organisation (which has embraced men within its membership since 1997) commands respect at the highest level of government because of its compassion and understanding of issues of injustice.

The Guild has evolved to become a source of great strength and importance not only across Scotland but around the world and we should give thanks for this gift from God which has proved to be such an enduring legacy for our Church.

Care Van Tea Party

On the 15th October, several “Ten Year Veterans” from Currie Kirk were invited to attend a special Tea Party at Polwarth Parish Church, basically to be thanked for volunteering their services to the Care Van which serves the homeless in Edinburgh. Bill and Elizabeth Wood, Jim Ure and Gordon Clephane were among 80 people who attended a rather flash spread (see picture below) of sandwiches and cakes served on tables adorned with pristine white tables cloths, large purple bows and celebratory balloons. The thank you celebrated over 800 years of volunteering by those in attendance. Alan Berry and his wife Anne were guests of honour and Alan spoke about the origins of Bethany Christian Trust, which was set up in 1983, when Alan was the minister of South Leith Baptist Church, in response to the needs of the many homeless and vulnerable people he confronted daily. In actual fact, the first caravan went out 30 years ago, in 1981, in the form of a car and a trailer – a far cry from the fully equipped, modern van, which now serves the homeless 365 days a year.

Entertainment in the afternoon was provided by a male-voice choir who sang in harmony a variety of songs, from the present and the past. They were excellent—my favourite was the Tony Christie classic, “Is this the way to Amarillo” which both Jim and Bill picked up on, so don’t be surprised if it’s included in the Kirk Singers repertoire at a future date. The food was served by several delightful teenagers from Currie Community High school who received a round of applause for their splendid efforts. 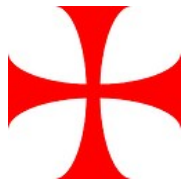
Clipboard Electronic Version

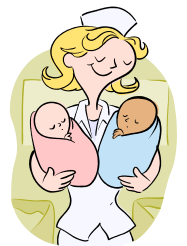
