A Letter from The Manse

Dear All,

Prepare for Change

Over the next four months we are facing considerable change as a congregation. Our lead organist, Margaret Douglas, will retire at the end of October, her playing having been greatly appreciated by successive ministers and the congregation over a long number of years. Margaret Gordon, who has made an invaluable contribution as Pastoral Associate, will retire at the end of the year. We now face the challenge and the opportunity that the departure of these two people presents to us.

At its meeting in August the Kirk Session agreed to advertise for an organist/pianist to lead the worship each Sunday morning and at special services. In addition, the successful applicant would be encouraged to develop the musical style of worship.

In regard to Margaret's position much of her focus is on pastoral visitation and Session has decided that from the beginning of next year, on a six month trial basis, the ongoing visiting of the elderly/housebound and those in hospital will be undertaken through the formation of a team of pastoral elders supported by the Minister.

At this time the Session would ask you to pray, that as we have been so well served over the years by the two Margaret's who are now leaving, the right person will be appointed to lead our music, and that those with the right pastoral skills will be identified to take forward our pastoral care. Pray also for the period of inevitable transition that we face in the coming months. Finally pray for those who are leaving, that God will richly bless them in the years ahead.

The Work goes on “To End Poverty”

As you may recall from the June Clipboard, Bryce Eunson and Graeme Coventry's parting legacy from all their hard work towards Christian Aid was the sum of £5,641 having been raised from the house to house collection.

Sadly the work of Christian Aid is one that must go on indefinitely as they aim to achieve their objective 'TO END POVERTY'. In addition to the 'main appeal' during Christian Aid week however, there are small ways in which we can continue this work throughout the year without any real effort or additional financial outlay to that already incurred in your daily life.

Do you, or a family member or neighbour have a computer? If so the chances are that you have, or know someone who has, a printer—Ink Jet and toner cartridges can be recycled. We have been collecting these for some time now with a collection point in the Gibson Craig Hall. From now, however, there will **also** be a box beside the Fresh Start boxes, in the Link Building. There are some cartridges that unfortunately cannot be recycled (Epson are the main one), but if in doubt, please put it in the box—I will happily sift out any that cannot be used to raise money. I recently took a carrier bag of cartridges to the Christian Aid offices, and although they do not normally give a valuation to each church, they agreed to do so, to give an idea of the money you raise. The contents of that carrier bag brought in £35. Not bad from our 'rubbish'!

Have you been abroad on holiday this year (or a previous year) and come back with some loose foreign change in your pocket? Unless you are someone who regularly goes back to the same country, the chances are that it may languish in a drawer 'in case it comes in handy'. Why not put this in a wee poly bag and bring it to church? (We will take notes too!). Simply put it in the same box as the one mentioned for ink cartridges—or hand to Val Reid in the Church Office.

Finally—possibly one where the children can help. Have you just got a new mobile phone? Old mobiles too can be recycled—whatever 'vintage'.

Gibson Craig Halls: Redevelopment of front car park

As part of our initial application process for the Gibson Craig Halls' Public Entertainment Licence, we undertook to address certain health and safety concerns which the Council had raised with us about the front car park area. Since then, we have been considering the options for improvement, consulting the Council informally on our plans as these have developed.

The net result is a plan which reconfigures the layout of the car park to improve access for, and the safety of, pedestrians and vehicles. This has now been submitted to the Council for planning consent which, if granted, will allow us to:

- create a separate, gated, pedestrian access on the west side of the car park area which leads to the main entrance and links to the path leading to the Guide Hall;
- widen the existing vehicle access, improving visibility for drivers;
- create a new ramped access serving the main door, the office and also the front hall emergency exit; and
- improve the car parking arrangements.

We hope to hear the outcome of our application towards the end of October. Watch this space ...

The Sneeze



In many parts of the world Christian traditions and values are under threat and sometimes this can be in the most subtle of ways. What follows is an alleged true story of a student graduation ceremony in Canada.

They walked in tandem, each of the ninety-two students filing into the already crowded auditorium. With their rich, maroon gowns flowing and the traditional capes, they looked almost as grown-up as they felt. Dads swallowed hard behind broad smiles, and mothers freely brushed away tears.

This class would not pray during the ceremony, not by choice, but because of a recent court ruling prohibiting it. The Principal and several students were careful to stay within the guidelines allowed by the ruling. They gave inspirational and challenging speeches, but no one mentioned divine guidance and no one asked for blessings on the graduates or their families.

*The speeches were nice, but they were routine, until the final speech received a standing ovation. A solitary student walked proudly to the microphone. He stood still and silent for just a moment, and then, it happened. All 92 students, every single one of them, suddenly **SNEEZED !!!!***

The student on stage simply looked at the audience and said, "GOD BLESS YOU" and walked off the stage. The audience exploded into applause. This graduating class had found a unique way to invoke God's blessing on their future with or without the court's approval.

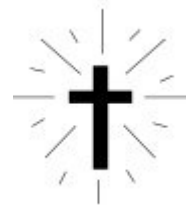

What is involved you may ask?

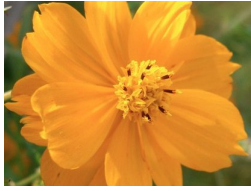
