# A Message from the Manse

My family and I have been moved and uplifted by the warmth of the welcome we have received from you, the people of Currie. (Thank you!) Slowly but surely I begin to put names to faces and faces to names. What is so nice is that if I am cycling about, or when the children walk to school, so many of you stop to wave, smile and say hello. Already Currie feels like a real community.

Having a sense of community was a key dimension of the early church and it is no less important in the church today. When we are willing to be open, to share with one another, to help out—or to involve our lives, our schools and our families in positive projects which benefit the lives of others then we are all blessed with a sense of belonging to something bigger than ourselves.

I value the model of community found in the image of our God as a Trinity. God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit are One and yet three distinct persons. The three persons of God are unique and yet they belong together and they belong to one another. They are intimately close, moving, living and being independently of and inter-dependently with one another. From the relational power of their love comes great energy and creativity.

Ultimately this sense of “belonging” is what being part of a church gives to all of us—not simply because we belong to one another as a spiritual community but because we all, independently and together, belong to God—God who knows each of us by name.

The Bible tells us that our names are written in the ‘book of life’. No matter what we endure or go through, God is with us. In Isaiah Chapter 43 the devout prophet cries out from God, “Do not be afraid for I have redeemed you. I have called you by your name, you are mine. For you are precious in my sight, you are honoured, and I love you.”

Well, I may not know all your names yet but I can say that my family and I are chuffed to feel that in some way, after only a short time, we feel that we ‘belong’ to Currie.

Last week my sister, her husband and family came over from America to visit us in the Currie Kirk Manse. During our “stay-cation” we enjoyed some fun Festival shows as well as some walks in the Pentland Hills. During one of those walks my nine year old American nephew was delighted to see real sheep for the first time. On one walk he commented, “In Currie, even the sheep are so friendly!” (photos of ‘friendly Pentland sheep’ courtesy of my sister Nicola!).

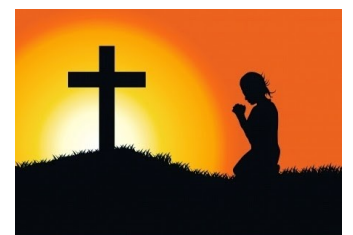
Lord, give them hope to believe in the possibility of new beginnings where freedom may replace fear,

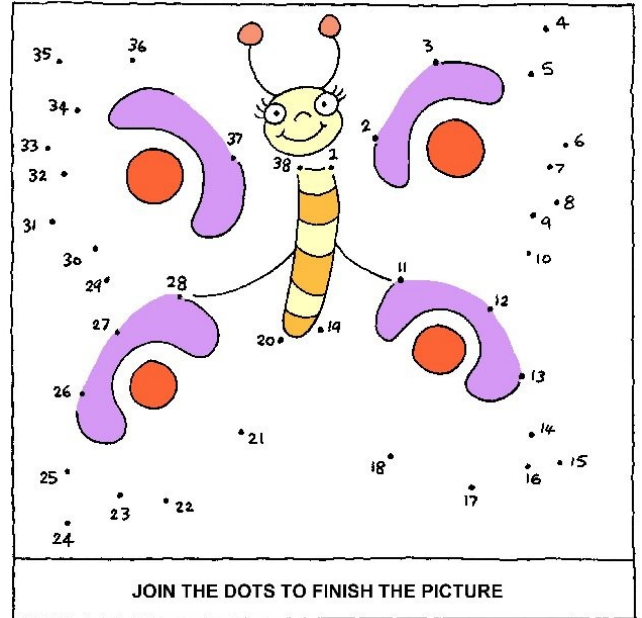
# Kidz@Currie

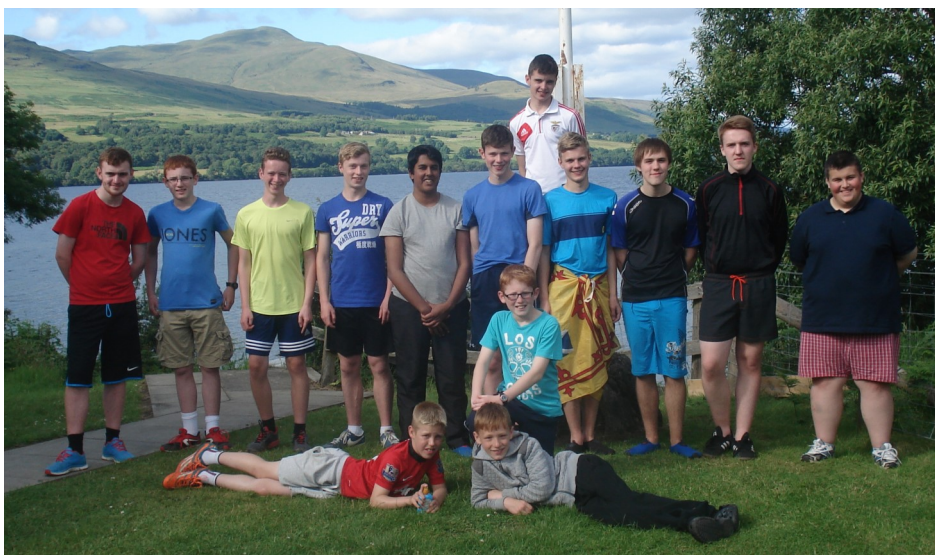
The camp as the photos show was enjoyed by all—officers and boys!!

## 25 Years Ago—A Volunteer's View

### A Ministry of Love and Help

I'M HOMELESS AND HUNGRY—CAN YOU HELP ME?

It was a usual Friday night; if I was being honest, I really did not want to be there. At 1am the thought of my warm bed was far too appealing. We had found out about a new sleeping place and we were heading there. We turned the corner to face an old derelict building. It was wet and I was cold, I wanted to go home, but we went in. The floor was lined with rubbish and the roof was non-existent. We waded through the rubbish to a doorway, the darkness was like a blanket surrounding us and the smell was unbearable. We headed into the room to what we thought were piles of rubbish but to my astonishment the rubbish piles moved, they were PEOPLE! The shock and guilt at my complacency struck me; I found it hard to talk.

This is not an isolated incident, there are men and women around Edinburgh sleeping in similar situations or even worse. Some, who are fit enough, walk all night because it is safer, less chance of them being mugged as the boys go home after a night out. *Matthew 25 v 35-40, "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat...I tell you the truth, whatever you did for the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."*

### Getting Involved

We can't all be out on the street to help these people but that doesn't mean that we can't get involved. Prayer and giving are just as important as being there. So now, when you walk past someone in the street who is homeless, you know that you could go that extra mile and be involved.

*This brilliant account of the Care Van work in its early days reminds us how far the service has come. From a grass roots beginning with a handful of willing volunteers who sought out people as they slept in hidden locations, the service has grown to be well known, stopping in more visible locations, with over 650 volunteers, in 41 church teams. One constant over the last 25 years is our reliance on God and his love for those that use this service.*

## Congratulations

Well known members of the local farming community and members of Currie Kirk, the Steven family (John, Carolyn, Rebecca and Rowena) won the top prize for Shetland sheep in mainland UK by winning the overall championship at The Highland Show with a 2-year old ram called Rosebank Neptune. He is a grey katmoget in colour. Shetland sheep are well known for the quality of their wool being the finest and softest of all UK native breeds. This year the Stevens also won first prize with one of their fleeces at The Highland. Daughter, Rowena, was also thrilled to have been placed first with her ram lamb, also a grey and is showing a keen interest in sheep as she has just started her own small flock of Kerry Hills.

As a family the Stevens have been showing at The Highland Show for 15 years and are delighted to have achieved one of their life ambitions. This follows on from winning the overall championship at The Shetland Sheep National Show and Sale last Autumn at Sedgemore.

From April through to October there is at least one or more local agricultural show throughout Scotland and the Stevens regularly travel most Saturdays to one of these shows. Drymen Show at the end of May, with its beautiful setting near the banks of Loch Lomond has been their most successful show to date, winning it six times.

Neptune, because of his win at The Highland Show this year, has qualified to compete against 19 other champions from throughout the country at Lanark, at the end of August, to see which Shetland will be crowned Champion of Champions 2015. All good wishes to Neptune!

Saturday 12 September at 7.30 pm—Currie Kirk

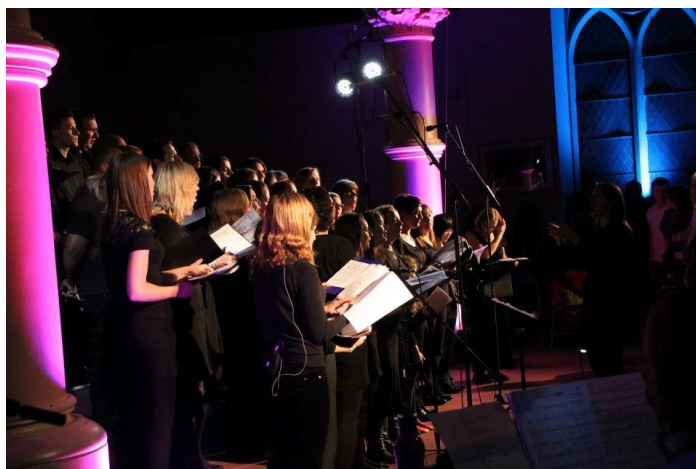
### “Music from Stage and Screen”

## Currie Fair—Saturday 6 September

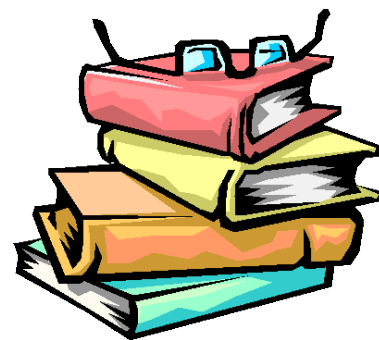

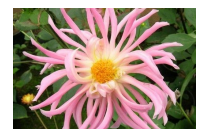
## Dear Friends,
