

Update on Presbytery Plan 2022-25

In October, Currie Kirk Session voted to request that The Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian place us in a Linkage with Balerno Parish Church which would mean each church retained its own Kirk Session and committees such as Finance.

However, in the latest version of the Draft Presbytery Plan we were placed in a Deferred Union with Balerno Church. We requested an explanation of what this means and why we could not have our preference for Linkage.

Dr Stewart Weaver, Convener of the Deployment Group, responsible for implementing The Presbytery Plan, said:

"With regards to Linkages, the national church is very much resistant to these because they are not 'resource light'. Indeed, the national church has asked us to alter all of the linkages that were proposed in the previous working document in order to ensure that their concerns are met. So, it would be extremely unlikely that a proposed linkage between Currie and Balerno would be accepted by the national church."

('Note: Resource Light means one Minister for two separate churches would have to attend/ moderate two separate Session Meetings, two finance Meetings etc which is a heavier time commitment for a Minister)

We at Currie Kirk Session also asked for a definition of Deferred Union ie does it mean that under a Deferred Union, both churches retain their own Kirk Sessions and control of their finances? When ultimately would this lead to a full Union?

Dr Weaver responded:

"With regards to a Deferred Union, I understand that, until the actual Union itself proceeds, the congregations would retain their own structures. For the point of a Union is one Kirk Session and, until a Union is actually implemented, it would follow that such areas as finance remain independent.

Having said that, if there is greater cooperation on the horizon, it may smooth transitions in the future if there were shared information or initiatives in pastoral care or worship or other mission activities. Some congregations have had their finance or property teams meet together in order to assure some kind mutual understanding and knowledge. I do hope that this provides a bit of helpful information."

It being obvious that Linkage would not be allowed, Currie Kirk decided to accept Presbytery's decision to place us in Deferred Union with Balerno in the Draft Plan. A deferred union means that when one of our ministers moves on, a vacancy committee from <u>both</u> churches calls a new minister to that church. Only when the other minster moves on do the churches unite under the existing minister, who of course was called by both churches.

All churches in The Presbytery voted on the Draft Plan on 15th November 2022 and agreed by majority to adopt The Presbytery Mission Plan for implementation from January 2023.

Currie and Balerno churches will continue to build on our good relationships to find additional and different ways of joining together to meet the needs of people in our area and beyond.



Cober and November have both been very busy months for the Guild. We have learnt about all that is involved in becoming a Wimbledon Umpire—not just a case of sitting up in the big chair or being positioned around the court. Many facts about Pontius Pilate and his time in the Holy Land were revealed to us. Towards the end of October we held our first proper Coffee Morning since 2019. It was marvellous to see the hall filled with people talking and chatting whilst enjoying the home baking provided by the Guild. Many thanks to all those who baked, supplied books and items for the tombola as well as those who attended. We raised £590 which is a marvellous sum to go to "Starchild".

Into November and we had two fantastic speakers. In a change of topic Tom Kelly took us back to the "Forgotten Fifties" with many pictures, videos and anecdotes. True to form we all enjoyed recognising and singing along with many of the artists of the time. Just did not like to realise it was 70 years ago! Keith Walker then took us on a wander round Edinburgh reminding us of cinemas we may have visited or ones we had never heard of. Nobody admitted to getting in using jam jars but there were a few giggles when he mentioned the chummie seats. November also saw our Rededication Service in Currie Kirk. It was a very uplifting occasion and Ernest, Easter's father, spoke movingly on "Hope" and tied it in beautifully with "Starchild".

So what is next? Unfortunately our last speaker of the year has just emailed to cancel, but I am hoping to find a replacement. So no chance of stocking up with Grace Chocolates just before Christmas. Our Christmas Party is on 20 December and we are all looking forward to that. I will be delivering many Advent Calendars to the Holy Trinity Foodbank for the start of the Advent Season. In January we will be having a Scottish afternoon meeting with "A Nicht wi' Burns".







A Sentimental Journey

Through song titles by Bill Wood

hen I was a "Tiny Little Baby" born and reared in the Honest Toun of Musselburgh among the "Dear Hearts and Gentle People" of "Neighbours", family and "Pal"s, it's "Little Wonder" that "As Time Goes By" and "When I Dream", "Precious Memories" come flooding back and "It is no Secret" "I Know" that "After All" "It's been a Long, Long Time" but "Life's Been Good to Me".

"Playing Around" in Fisherrow Harbour as a boy, seeing the many fishing boats namely "The Evening Prayer", "The Bread of Life", "The Morning Light", the "Iona", "Whispering Hope" and many "More", the fleet returning with their catches tied up along the "Harbour Wall", the wives and "Sweethearts Hurry on Down" to "Welcome" their menfolk back from the fishing grounds; the men who although "So Tired" after their hard labours and complaining that they "Couldn't Sleep a Wink Last Night", glad to see "The Harbour Lights" knowing the truth of the words "You'd be so Nice to Come Home to" and longing to be "Near You" as they greeted their womenfolk.

The sad wartime "Memories" of my father in uniform "Off to War" were not "Without a Song" as "Bluebirds over the White Cliffs of Dover", "I'll be Seeing You" and "Let the People Sing" were among many songs played on the wireless – if not "Always" almost "Constantly".

After the *"Surrender"* of the Axis in 1945, the *"Promises and Dreaming"* were almost brought to reality from *"Beyond the Sunset"* and after taking *"One day at a Time"*, the nation could *"Start Living Again"* and return to the *"Way we Were"*.

Growing up so close to the sea, it's little wonder that "Deep in My Heart" I had a "Dream" and spent four years in "Bell Bottom Blues" visiting a lot of those "Far Away Places" which I had "Longed For". I then completed two years National Service in the RAF with "Those Amazing Men in their Flying Machines". This was followed by a four-year tour with Parachute Regiment Volunteers – "Waltzing in the Clouds" – during which time I donned another uniform and learned that on occasions "A Policeman's Lot is not a Happy One" – not for all the 30 years!

Despite all of my uniform background, I was not "A Man Alone" and meantime "I Found a Friend" in Jesus. I invited him to "Abide with Me" and know that His "Love's been Good to Me". So when "My Heart and I" ask "Who can I Turn To?", I remember my spiritual visit to "The Old Rugged Cross" when I came "Closer My God to Thee" and promised "I'll Walk with God".

After my illness last year *"I know" "There are Such Things"* as forgiveness and faith in Christ *so "Its Impossible"* not to feel the Holy Spirit *"Close to You"* in *"My Time of Need"*. I can now fully understand the wording of *"Count Your Blessings"*. I've counted them. Have you? *"Amazing Grace"*.

This is the MBE awarded to the Care Van for the service it provides to the homeless. The care van goes out every night of the year apart from Hogmanay due to the logistics.
