Update : Edinburgh Direct Aid in 2022

EDA in Ukraine

B eginning in March 2022, EDA volunteers have frequently visited Ukraine, charged with helping those who are living in conditions of shortage and extremity in hard-to-get-to places. To do this our people, acting on the advice of local contacts, use money donated by supporters like yourself to hire vehicles and buy supplies, and then distribute them in person (insofar as possible). This has taken Edinburgh Direct Aid to many parts of Ukraine ranging from Lviv to some in-the-news trouble spots such as Mikolaev, Chernobyl and Kramatorsk, in and around which our volunteers have distributed much-appreciated aid. The war and the hardship continue. The help which we provide can meet only a tiny fraction of the need, but fortunately there are many other NGOs and informal groups whom we work alongside. This collective effort makes a difference, perhaps even more because of the effect that personal support by people from far away has on morale, than because of the material aid delivered.

Lebanon:

In Lebanon there is not a fighting war, but the woes of this country of 3½ million Lebanese and 2 million refugees are extreme. This is due mainly to a continuation of the hyper-inflation which started three years ago. The Lebanese pound Is now worth only a fraction of what it was then, but salaries and refugee allowances have not kept up, or even close. As a result, most Lebanese and refugees alike can hardly afford to buy food, and winter fuel is also almost beyond reach. About 1/3 of the 50,000 Syrian Refugees in Arsal (the hill-top border town where we work) live in makeshift rented housing and shacks rather than tents. But many now are unable to afford the rent as landlords seek to cover their losses: and many become homeless. Working with other NGOs, EDA helps to find shelter for these families, providing them with tented structures with kitchen, sleeping, and living areas and a small toilet. In 2022 we helped to rehouse nearly 50 families in this way, in addition to providing emergency help to those who lost their tents and all their possessions due to several recent fires in the camps.

But all has not been gloom: in our primary school now styled "The Scottish Training Centre", we have continued to look after 150 pupils and have succeeded in providing certificates to enable many of

them to proceed to Lebanese secondary schools. Brighter still is the music teaching we now provide at the school and therapeutic music at the Balsam centre for children with special needs (which we also support). This programme was started by Nigel Osborne and Clea Friend from Edinburgh, and other experts, from Croatia.

A musician from Beirut, with local help in Arsal, conducts lessons and therapeutic sessions two days a week, bringing both relaxation and joy to children who are in sore need of both. In addition, following discussions extending over a number of years, we held the first of a



proposed series of festivals of music and sport aimed at bringing together children from different communities: refugees and Lebanese, Shia, Sunni and Christian. The first such festival was held in Baalbek (not far from Arsal) in May. With an attendance of over 3000 children, it was judged a success by all concerned, including the provincial Governor whose future support is now guaranteed.

Other highlights of the year include bringing into full operation a solar powered system to replace the now unaffordable diesel electric system, to pump water from a borehole for irrigation in a group of farms overlooking the town. This solar power now also powers fresh water to many Lebanese houses and refugee tents. Solar power was also installed at number of schools, including our own; and even the local police station (funded by the Scottish Police Federation). In addition we have set up a number of children's libraries and reading centres in the camps around Arsal, which has done wonders for the literacy, and enjoyment, of the many children involved. Finally, our support on a loan basis for a project to turn currently waste sheep fleeces into thermal insulation and quilts is showing signs of real success.

Warehouse deliveries

During the year we have despatched to Lebanon from our Granton warehouse two 10-ton shipping containers, filled with clothes, footwear, toiletries and educational goods, for distribution to refugees and poor Lebanese alike, in Arsal and other locations.

Jim Ure

Jim was born on 14 May 1941 in Edinburgh. He was the first child of Bill and Violet. His father had just been called up to the home guard and Jim, Violet and his granny moved in together to 10 Watson Crescent. After the war, the family moved to 55 Magdalene Drive, where Jim's brother Bill was born in 1947. Jim attended Parsons Green Primary school. His most memorable day at school was when he was 8 years old, when he arrived home after a long tiring day to find out he had a baby sister Davena.

After going to Portobello High school, Jim briefly studied Applied Physics at college before Rheumatic Fever forced him to change direction. Those early studies sparked a curiosity in science, engineering and mathematics which he passed on to his children. He later joined the Met Office at Leuchars airport.

Jim met Maureen in 1963 at Bristo Technical College. He moved shortly to London for work, Maureen followed him down later and married on the 14 September 1968 in Edinburgh at St John Vianneys.

Jim was working at Leuchars and the family moved to Newport-on-Tay, where Kirsty was born. Another career change into Finance and Insurance brought Jim back to Edinburgh. They bought their house at 3 Pentland Crescent and Cameron was born in 1972. After a couple of years back in Edinburgh, the family moved to Juniper Green and then Balerno. In 1987 the family moved to Currie. With the move to Currie, Jim and Maureen became involved with village life and Jim joined the Pentland Players. His portrayal of some of his stage characters and, in particular, the soldier in "Fiddler On the Roof" had the audience in stitches, with Jim, arms folded, doing a traditional Russian dance. Jim was always very busy at Christmas time—being called on to play Santa—his favourite time of the year.

Jim retired from Financial Services in 2001 and rather than resting, he joined the Patient Transport Service for a further five years—a job he loved. He would always proudly tell everyone he was an ambulance driver! He was very proud to be a Freemason and member of Lodge Colinton and Currie. He was a very active member of Currie Kirk, becoming an Elder. He drove the mini bus collecting the parishioners to take them to and from church and the day-care centre. He helped out the Bethany Christian Trust and went out with the Care Van around the streets of Edinburgh handing out soup and warm clothes to homeless people. Always going the extra yard, Jim would often take a flask of soup and a torch and go through the graveyards in Edinburgh looking for homeless to ensure no one was missed.

Jim has made so many friends, lifelong friends that are sadly no longer with us and friends through his time in Currie and working at the hospital. He is remembered by everyone for his kindness, helpfulness and sense of humour. This has been reflected in the messages Maureen and the family have received.

Jim endured and weathered cancer treatments for many years and he did so with great perseverance and immense support from his family, especially Maureen. He was blessed in his last days to remain at home as was his wish, surrounded by his loved ones who were grateful to the Marie Curie nurses.

Jim was a character. But he was not only a fun person, but a faithful person. He was a devoted husband, father, grandfather, brother, brother-in-law, uncle and friend. He had a long hard battle with cancer. He laughed and smiled, but it was a hard and brave fight. We gathered in the Kirk which meant so much to him to honour his life and commend him to God's care and keeping. - Easter

Catherine Crawford

Eulogy by Margaret Gordon

Catherine Crawford was born in Dunfermline on 2 July 1941, younger daughter of Jemima and Eddie Lambert, and died unexpectedly on 14 November 2022. The family moved to Edinburgh when Janette and Catherine were young and lived in Polwarth Terrace. Catherine attended Tynecastle High School.

On leaving school Catherine worked in the Post Office, a job she enjoyed until her marriage. In those days she could not continue her work once she was married.

From a young age Catherine attended the Marjory Middleton School of Dance in the city where she excelled, enjoying ballet, ballroom and tap. Catherine met George, her husband to be at Afton Dance Hall in Niddrie Street and in 1961 they were married in Pilrig Church in Edinburgh. Married life began in Academy Street in Leith. It was there that twins Stuart and Neill and later Susan spent their first years.

In 1971 the Crawford family moved to Balerno and Malleny Avenue, Catherine's home for the remainder of her life. Catherine returned to work in the early 70's, firstly part time unsocial hours but shortly afterward began working for Manpower Services in St Andrew Square then Corstorphine and latterly at the Job Centre at Wester Hailes from where she retired in 2001.

Sadly, George died some thirty years ago in the Marie Curie Hospice. Catherine never forgot the care he received there and after her retirement spent many years volunteering there three days a week, driving folks mainly to the day hospice but also helping out at the Centre. A job she undertook until lockdown.

Catherine was ordained as an elder in Currie Kirk in 1999. She was a member of the Guild, the Walking Group, the Prayer Group and the Minibus Committee. She joined the groups from the Church to Israel and Iona. She also served on the Parents' Committee of the 65th Boys' Brigade Company.

When people heard of the news of Magnus's death invariably the phrase on their lips was 'He was a lovely man'. Born on 17th December 1934, Magnus died on 19th December 2022.

The sea coursed through the blood of generations of Polsons and it was therefore natural that, following his education at Leith Academy, the young Magnus should feel its call. He gained his Master's Certificate in June 1962, becoming a Captain in 1976 and worked for several different shipping companies before retiring in December 1993.

Following retiral Magnus devoted considerable time to the activities of Trinity House in Leith and Currie Kirk. He served in the prestigious post of Master of the Corporation of Leith Trinity House and had a key role in the establishment of a memorial in Leith dedicated to the 6,500 seafarers who lost their lives during the two world



wars and various other conflicts. He also was instrumental in securing the future for Trinity House through the sale of seven paintings including four by Sir Henry Raeburn. Over the years Magnus represented Trinity House at many civic functions.

Magnus's service to Currie Kirk is legendary. For many, many years he served on the Congregational Board as Property Convener with responsibility for the buildings at the Church, the Gibson Craig Halls and the Manse. Nothing was too much for Magnus resulting in one of our Ministers christening him Saint Magnus because he always seemed to be on hand to deal with whatever property issue arose. When the Gibson Craig Halls were being extended in 2003 Magnus took it upon himself to visit the site every day to make sure that everything was going to plan. The project was completed on time and within budget thanks in no small way to Magnus's dedication. The creation of the Reception Area in 2015 was another project in which Magnus made a significant contribution within the team charged with its development. He acted as Covenant Treasurer for a short period, was involved for many years in the recording of services at Currie Kirk, was a Team Leader in the ecumenical weekly snack lunches in the Gibson Craig Halls with the reputation of his homemade spicy carrot and lentil soup being way above Master Chef standard. Time didn't seem to matter to Magnus for when the clock had to be changed at the church in the spring and autumn, he would attend to this—but at two o'clock in the morning.

Captain Magnus Polson was a one off, someone I have been proud to call my friend. There can be no finer way to sum up the life of Captain Magnus Shearer Polson than in words from the New Testament, crafted in the 4th chapter of 2 Timothy:

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith."

Rest well Captain.
