The Scriptures-read by Mary Thomson

Genesis 1: 1-5

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.

Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters.

And God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light.

God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness.

God called the light 'day', and the darkness he called 'night'. And there was evening, and there was morning – the first day.

Matthew 5:14-16

You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden.

Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house.

In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.

Luke 11:33-36

'No one lights a lamp and puts it in a place where it will be hidden, or under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, so that those who come in may see the light.

Your eye is the lamp of your body. When your eyes are healthy, your whole body also is full of light. But when they are unhealthy, your body also is full of darkness.

See to it, then, that the light within you is not darkness.

Therefore, if your whole body is full of light, and no part of it dark, it will be just as full of light as when a lamp shines its light on you.'

Sermon



We do not have to be experts in science to recognise that light is a necessity of life. Almost every life form of life on our planet needs the light of our Sun to survive. The Sun, at the centre of the solar system is about 93 million miles away and every plant, every animal and each human being is dependent upon it's light for life and warmth.

Since the beginning of human time, those with any religious sensitivity have acknowledged a dependence upon light. In primitive religions it was believed that the Sun was a God. In the northern provinces, because the daylight hours became shorter when temperatures fell to freezing in winter, people believed that the heavens must be displeased.

And so, it is not too difficult to draw direct parallels between light with its blessings of goodness, and growth with darkness and its curse of coldness, cruelty and the realms of fear and death.

When I was in Aberdeen, working at the University, we held an inter-faith event every November on National Inter-faith Day. Usually, we picked one theme upon which each faith could present something meaningful from their own faith perspective. We chose different themes like 'Charity', or 'feasting and fasting', 'teaching and learning' each year. The year we chose the theme of light, we recognised how much our need for light resonates with all of us, and connected us together across our different faiths.

And so, it is with our faith as Christians. From the ancient Jewish faith through to Christ's teachings, we are called to seek the direction of life-giving light.

Walking in the 'Light of the Lord' is a recurring theme in the Old Testament. When God said, 'Let there be Light' God enabled creation to begin, and the creation of life began. And so we read in scripture that God enabled Noah to walk in the light of God's ways and God's love, as also did Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebecca, Jacob and so many of the prophets like Amos, Elijah and Ezekiel . . . these descendants of each and every generation followed a faith that was in accord with and drew them towards the light of the Lord.

This is why scripture is sometimes described as a "lamp unto our feet." When we lose our way in life or feel lost about a situation—the sacred wisdom of the ancient passages and through prayer, we can often find our way ahead. This is no small thing in our world of fake news and social media. How much we need to find truth under our true freedom in the wisdom of our forefathers and foremothers, their teachings, their hard lived yet faithful and prayerful lives which are testimony to the light.

John Bright, a great biblical scholar, wrote, "We can look to the people of the Bible as reflections of ourselves, and since human nature has not really changed over the centuries, we can feel an affinity with so many Biblical personalities, to experience God's message in our own lives—both in the Old and New Testaments."

Recently the Guild hosted a speaker named Canon Mike Parker who is a great supporter of the Bible Society. He reminded us all that a Church without the Bible at the centre is like having an expensive car without a Motor in it to run. The Bible is our teaching, the source of our faith and our identity as followers of Jesus.

There are many modern-day stories of saints who have drawn humanity to the light. People who have overcome great difficulties and fought great wars against injustices.

When we talk about life and light, there is an urgency within our generation that affects everyone. It was heartening to know that faith leaders from every different and diverse faith met recently in Rome to explain that there should be no strife between faith and science. These two things do not contradict when it comes to facing up to real global problems that require partnership, cooperation and work of scientists, politicians as well as people of faith who care about humanity and creation. Faith leaders are all working to do their bit towards saving our planet, saving life, and stemming the end of catastrophic climate change. Scientists, politicians, and faith leaders can come together on this. It is an area where the youth, the young are the champions of the cause, calling our world to seek light and to be accountable.

When the light is shining upon us, our actions are metaphorically visible. The light reveals what people try to keep in the dark—the corruption, the deception. And so, in this way Divine light elevates us to be released from dark behaviours, or untruths.

Our need for light to live and our need for light to survive is so important. The greenhouse effect, pollution, genocide, dictatorships. Corruption, prejudice . . . the list seems to go on. But we as people of faith need not despair. The light of the Lord enables us to keep our vision clear. Together we can uphold a vision for a better world. A world where children are protected and cared for, educated and safe. A vision of global peace and justice. A vision of human dignity and human rights. Theis vision cannot ever be allowed to become blurred by powers of darkness.

I read through the Guild themes for this year, and one other thought came to light. Helen Eckford, Guild Vice Convenor reminds us that each one of us has the God-given ability to shine a light. We each have gifts, some inherited, others learned, and we have talents and personalities, and we are all unique but each of us is called to shine light in the world and not to hide our gifts. Because God has confidence in us and even when there are period of darkness from time to time in life, we are invited to walk with Jesus through the future with the lamp of God's word undergirding our path and with the Light of the World illuminating every step of the way.
