This year's campaign is focused on action to stop climate change.

Father we thank you for those who in 1945 had the vision and faith to start Christian Aid, we thank you for the thousands of people who are now working through Christian Aid to help others.

We pray especially for this year's campaign which seeks to educate and stimulate action to stop climate change and so provide a sustainable environment for future generations.

We ask this in the name of Jesus who taught us to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven; hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors.
Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

Meditations

Reflection by André

In this text Jesus tells his disciples what real LOVE is. I wonder what their experiences have been of LOVE. Did they understand LOVE like Jesus explained it? I guess we will never know.

What we do know, is how we understand LOVE and how our world often portrays LOVE.

Sometimes we are made to believe that TRUE LOVE is only possible in films. Others, especially those who have experienced broken relationships or have been witnesses to friends and relatives splitting up—will have a different perspective on LOVE. The Beatles once sang: *All we need is LOVE!* But then soon after they produced this hit song, they broke up, which does make you wonder?

In our text Jesus is portraying a different LOVE—a LOVE that is unbreakable, true, trusting, joyous, faithful and constant. Jesus is making the point that this LOVE is only possible because He loved His creation first.

And because of HIS love, His people are capable of the same LOVE, as long as they remain obedient to HIM through faith. If they remain in His commandments, they will experience LOVE that surpasses all human understanding. But His LOVE is sacrificial. He gave HIS life so that people of faith can live.

God already gave us HIS LOVE. To keep it, we need to have faith in the TRIUNE God—believing that God the Father made us all wonderfully well and gave HIS only Son Jesus Christ to redeem all our sins on the cross, who died for us but was resurrected and ascended to heaven, that we can live in the HOPE of inheriting the coming Kingdom. We need to believe that God’s Holy Spirit was outpoured for us so that we can go out and proclaim God’s Salvation to the world, always believing that God is present among us through His Holy Spirit—convincing, motivating and nourishing our faith on a daily basis.

We also should share this love, everywhere we go and not keep to and for ourselves, something that Christian Aid stands for.

Maybe the Beatles should have said: “All the world need is GOD’s LOVE”.

Reflection by Easter

Last week we celebrated the theme of **Love** in our local community, and this week it is a privilege and joy to team up with Balerno to celebrate the theme of Love with our neighbouring church nearby and also across the world as we highlight the fantastic work of Christian Aid.



I mentioned last week that Jesus doesn’t simply invite us or encourage us to love. In John’s Gospel, he commands us to love. Throughout John, Jesus says, “This is my commandment that you love one another as I love you.” To love is the foremost commandment of the Christian Faith.

C S Lewis wrote a book explaining there are actually four words for love in the biblical Greek. There is Eros, romantic love; Agape, an affectionate love for one’s family/pets; and Phileo which is an intimate form of friendship, sometimes translated as “Brotherly Love.” Whilst all these are gifts from God, the last form of love to which Jesus and Paul most refer is translated sometimes as Charity or Divine Kindness. This love is not a mere touchy romantic sentiment. The bible uses all sorts of language to describe this love. It is patient, kind, caring, selfless, puts another first, always desires good. This is the love that can weather life’s storms and scrapes, that abides the test of time because it is eternal, rooted in the nature of God himself. Jesus says, “If you love me, keep my commandments, if you love me feed my sheep.” Love is purposeful and practical. We show Christ love when we do simple things to show we care for other people, such as when we feed the hungry, offer water to the thirsty and tend the poor and sick.

When asked by a lawyer, which of the commandments matter most, Jesus offered the Golden Rule, “Love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and mind and strength AND love your neighbour as you love yourself.”

When I was a student, one of my favourite and most formative classes was taught by Gustavo Gutierrez, a liberation theologian from Peru. He taught us that the idea of our neighbour should never be abstract. In the first world it is as if the well off and well to do, often might think of their neighbour as someone, over

there, someone needing our help, a charity case. This mode of thinking underscores a sort of us/them dynamic. Gutierrez argued, to think of our neighbour as the 'other' is to miss out on the real meaning of Christ's call to love. We are all equally neighbours as God's children. The creation of God's kingdom on earth means we are called to work together in the pursuit of justice and health for all. Human liberation from poverty, oppression, corruption—the creation of a more heavenly earth requires that we understand that despite differences in circumstances and cultures, we are all neighbours.

One thing that Covid has brought to light is that this crisis cannot be solved individually despite what isolationist or colonialist think. Some might say, "well as long as we are vaccinated in our country, we are safe . . . who cares about people elsewhere." There is no room for such isolationist thinking at such a time. We recognise that unless we distribute vaccines, oxygen and PPE fairly to all, we are all still in danger.

I have noticed that the generations coming up. Generation Z they call it, I think? (I am Generation X and millennials are known as Generation Y . . . but the upcoming Gen Z, my kids, your kids are so aware that if we want to tackle the greatest threats and problems in our world, we will need joined up, cohesive thinking. Gen Z is well aware that problems such as the threat of Covid, Climate Change, Cyber-attacks need great local and international cooperation. There can be no us/them divide or duality between ourselves and our neighbours. We need practical as well as political solution to face poverty, pollution, plastic waste, or pandemics.

This is why Christian Aid is such a fantastic cause. It brings us, in practical ways, closer to real people in their real-life settings and struggles. Christian Aid helps us engage personally and practically with our neighbours near and far. We hear our neighbours across the globe recount real stories of individual people and projects so we can connect with the situation. We watched the video of Florence. This week Christian Aid also highlights the story of Rose in Kenya. The changes in climate year on year with hotter weather and less rain has caused long droughts in Rose's village. With such uncertainty about water, crops are at risk and this will create food shortages.



Christian Aid is doing so much to help build water wells, to provide animals and educational possibilities not only in Kenya but in 27 of the poorest countries world-wide by creating sustainable projects to help people help themselves. Christian Aid is committed to ending world poverty and this year in particular to fighting climate change. This is why their slogan is "We believe in life before death."

So just to recap, here are simple ways you can donate. If you go to the Christian Aid website, it is easy to click on a link to donate and find out what your donation could be used for. Currie has ordered hundreds of little envelopes for cash or cheques. These can be left at the Gibson Craig Hall and, importantly there is a gift aid declaration to tear off and put into the envelope with your donation. Lastly, for fun, we are hosting a Christian Aid Quiz at 7pm on Saturday 29th May. This will be a virtual quiz of course, on Zoom. If you'd like to join, just let Nina know in the Currie Kirk Office and she will register you.

In the meantime, it has been a pleasure to work together with Balerno on this worship and hopefully we can share worship like this again.

Till we cast our crowns before thee, lost in wonder, love, and praise.

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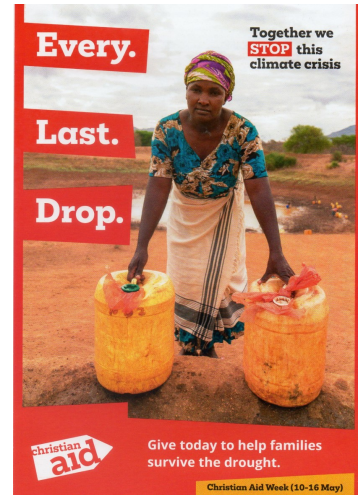
Prayer

Amen

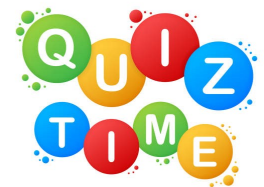
This year the focus is on the climate crisis and our global neighbours in Kenya who continue to battle the effects of extreme weather. Like last year Kenya is caught in a cycle of climate chaos—severe droughts and flooding rob villagers like Rose of a reliable source of water. There is an earth dam not far from Rose’s home which should be a lifeline but it runs out of water too quickly, forcing villagers to walk long and exhausting journeys to fetch water. The pandemic has made the lack of water even worse as handwashing with soap and water is vital to stay safe against the virus. Christian Aid can help communities like Rose’s withstand climate chaos: from building better earth dams to harvest more water, to sowing drought-tolerant crops, to demanding climate justice at the highest level.
